Last week was a first for me, I was fortunate enough to meet a published author! Oxfordshire-based <u>Colin Wade</u> has written a number of crime and mystery novels. Having heard about our <u>TeaBooks</u> groups, Colin contacted me earlier this year, and kindly offered to come and speak. Fast forward a few months, and I found myself in <u>Abingdon Library</u> with members of our Abingdon TeaBooks group alongside members of the public, all eagerly waiting for the talk to begin.



We learned about Colin's journey to becoming a full-time author, and thoroughly enjoyed finding out where he gets his ideas from and how he develops them. I hadn't realised that it takes almost as long to edit and publish a book as it does to write the first draft! The Q & A session at the end was a great opportunity for us to find out more and ask all sorts of things including whether any real people are represented in the books.

What struck me was the fact that Colin hasn't always been an author. Writing is something he came to after a 30-year career in project management:

I consider myself to be an uncreative person, I'm not musical and I'm terrible at art and craft. I surprised myself when I started writing and realised it was something I could do.

Discovering a new career in later life must have been exciting, though I imagine quite daunting at first. Colin spoke about the importance of learning to handle the rejection you experience prior to seeing your first novel on the shelf of a bookshop. It's about being passionate about your craft and having confidence in your writer's voice. Writing about what you know, be it places or scenarios, is always a good starting point. Colin has been able to use his experience as a civilian in the police force to provide his readers with authentic insight into police procedure, including for his latest book, <u>The Devil's Code</u>.

I'd like to say a huge thank you to Colin, as well as Abingdon Library and our Abingdon TeaBooks group. It was a very enjoyable morning, and here's hoping for more similar opportunities in the future.

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
