I've always had a disability, always had to do things differently and it comes easier to me to think differently, be creative [...] You might not be able to play the guitar now, but you can bang a drum, you can sing [...] You might've been good at that but you can be good at this [...] I'm here to show everyone that you can make music."

We can all make music, at any age, but when you start to believe what the media and society tells you about ageing, you can be forgiven for thinking that you can't. This constant narrative of decline, loss, reduction, decrepitude associated with age is all around us and it soaks in deep. No matter what your age today, take a moment to think about your life in your 70s, 80s, 90s, beyond... are you imaging the frail, sad, lonely person in a high back chair, lit in blue light, often seen in adverts or are you-like all of us-imaging that you are the exception to the rule and that, faced with a challenge like this, you would overcome adversity without the need for 'Jo'? Perhaps, instead of focusing on exceptional individuals, we should be fighting for a better universal offer for older people, including those who are living with a disability or caring responsibilities- Age Friendly Creativity for everyone.

So, how about we start a movement, sharing all the Age Friendly Creative activities that are already happening across the country as a collective? How about we find ways to be more Age Friendly in our cultural venues and take positive action? How about we give profile to people like Jo- and all those cultural leaders- to be our ambassadors and inspire our communities? How about we give a counternarrative to those people who feel like they can't make music... or art, theatre, dance, poetry...
